
We continued to see call volume fluctuate and continue our efforts to be prepared for calls.

This number is 7 calls ahead of last year's count.


Our daily call average for the month of January is 10.55 calls per day.

## Fire Prevention

Construction for Christian Brothers Automotive is complete, and they are now open for business. Progress continues for the new Tidal Wave Auto Spa on Bridgewater Landing, they encountered some weather delays, however they are now back on track. Construction for the new Canes Chicken on Bridgewater Landing is moving along quickly, we completed the hydro and underground inspections the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of February. The renovation in Bridgewater falls for Crumbl Cookie is complete, they passed their final inspection and are slated to open the 22<sup>nd</sup> of March. The MSC Bridgewater storage units on Anchor Drive continue to make progress, their Hydro and underground inspections passed, completion date still unknown. Construction in the Timber Trails, Timber Hill, Walden Springs and Windsor Pointe subdivisions continues with several new homes and multi family Structures being built. We will continue to monitor progress at all the above locations.

### **General Department Information**

Engine 212 returned to service, awaiting some final repairs.

The trustees approved hiring two part time members at the February meeting, one of which has already been cleared and is operating on shift.

This month was filled with many meetings as I began transitioning into the role of Fire Chief.

We continue to work on keeping up with maintenance of our apparatus.

We saw great cross cooperation between our fire, police and road crew on a Tractor Trailer Fire on By Pass 4, showing us what a One Team concept looks like in the street.

The department operated at several mutual aid fires in February, providing this mutual aid is a mutual benefit for all departments involved as no one department can handle this type of event alone.


We attended several planning meetings for upcoming events such as the easter egg hunt and the solar eclipse.

The Department continues our efforts to be fiscally responsible and operate within our budget.


