We continued to see call volume increasing as restrictions are continuing to have less and less impact on department operations. This number is 103 calls ahead of last year's count.


Our daily call average for the month of June is 11.7 calls per day.

We continue to experience an increase in back-to-back calls. We continue tracking this in 2023 in our efforts to remain proactive to changes in our community.

As we completed the month, we have continued our efforts to meet calls for service. We look forward to working with our neighboring departments as we partner together to meet the needs of our communities. Mutual Aid continues to be a cost-effective means for all area fire departments to deal with surges in requests for service. You will note an increase in the number of calls we are using mutual aid. We all try to maintain resources capable of meeting our average needs. However, we all need to have in place a plan to address unexpected requests.

Fire Prevention

During the Month of June, we continued to monitor new construction projects here in the Township. Contractors are making good progress on the new Starbucks location and are currently in the process of finishing out the interior. 7950 Seward Rd. has a tenant for that building, we expect to be working with them in the near future to build out the interior of that building. 8200 Seward Rd. is finished and waiting for a tenant lease. Progress continues in the commercial strip on Menards Blvd as well as Christian Brothers Automotive next door to Discount Tire. The Timber Trails and Windsor Pointe subdivisions continue to grow with work continuing on several new homes and Multi Family Structures. Construction has begun at the Walden Springs subdivision, with 2 structures already under roof and several more planned.

Fire Inspections for June focused on reinspection's, as well as plan reviews for several existing and new businesses.

During the Month of June FTFD took part in 3 public relations events. Crews had the opportunities to speak with the children about fire safety at the East

YMCA summer camp, as well as Kinder Care on Morris Rd. On June 22nd, we were invited to the Timber Hill Reserve camp where Engine 211's crew sprayed down the kids. We look forward to several other PR details we have scheduled through the remainder of the year.

General Department Information

I am continuing to work with the Board of Trustees and the Administrator to develop a process for the hiring of a Fire Chief and an Assistant Fire Chief.

Chris Simpson has submitted his resignation as he has accepted a fulltime position with Colerain Township Fire Department. His last day will be July 21, 2023. He will be missed and has been a great member of our department. We will be looking to hire a replacement for his position.

Summer workers have been working hard to get the hydrants painted. The weather this year has been very cooperative, and we expect to complete the project by the end of July. Inspector Peters has done an excellent job of supervising the summer help making sure we are getting things done.

Annual Pump testing was completed all units passed annual testing, E212 will be tested after returning from repairs.




Financial Information

The Department continues our efforts to be fiscally responsible and operate within our budget.




