We continued to see call volume increasing as restrictions are continuing to have less and less impact on department operations. This number is 122 calls ahead of last year's count.


Our daily call average for the month of November is 9.8 calls per day.

Fire Prevention

Construction for Christian Brothers Automotive is moving along fast, most of the exterior of the building is finished. The contractors are currently working on installing garage doors, and then they will need to finish out the interior of the building. Teriyaki Madness and Tropical Smoothie Café are now open for business at 2889 Joseph Drive. Progress continues for the new Tidal Wave Auto Spa on Bridgewater Landing. Construction for the new Canes Chicken on Bridgewater Landing has started, the fence around the property is up, and they are beginning site work. Renovations have started at the vacant occupancy in Bridgewater Falls where Crumbl Cookie will be located, they are currently working on the HVAC and Fire Suppression systems. The MSC Bridgewater storage units on Anchor Drive continue to make progress, 2 of the buildings are currently under construction with a 3rd planned for a future expansion. Construction in the Timber Trails, Timber Hill, Walden Springs and Windsor Pointe subdivisions continues with several new homes and multi family Structures being built. We will continue to monitor progress at all the above locations under construction.

Fire Inspections for November focused on our big box stores. During the Holidays, we tend to see an increase in fire code violations due to the large quantity of merchandise on hand in these stores for the Holiday Season. During those inspections no major fire code violations were noted, however we did work with some of the businesses to remedy a few small issues.

During the Month of November, FTFD participated in two public relations events. Our duty crews and admin staff participated in the Veterans Day Parade and Ceremony on November 9th which took place at the Veteran's Memorial behind Station 211. FTFD also had the pleasure

of escorting Santa into the Bridgewater Christmas tree lighting on November 24th. I would personally like to thank our crews as well as the Fire Corp Members who assisted with that detail.

The department continues to receive applications for both full and part time positions.


Engine 212 remains out of service and has been returned to Specialty awaiting the completion of repairs.

Medic 211 repairs were completed, and the unit is back in service.






The Department continues our efforts to be fiscally responsible and operate within our budget.





- New iPads came in for all frontline apparatus and staff vehicles. We changed service from Verizon to T-Mobile which translates into significant cost savings over the course of a year. New cases and mounts were purchased to prolong the life and make it easier for the crews to see and use them. There are 2 new iPads for each unit. One will be used as a 'CAD' iPad. These will provide dispatch information and will cut down on radio traffic once the Field Ops programs are installed by BRICS. The other iPads will be used to complete Fire and EMS reports which are required by the State of Ohio.

• Setup the ESO/Health Data Exchange portal through Emergency Networking. EMS crews will now enter a number unique to each patient in the Patient Care Report. This allows the hospital to see our reports and for us to see the patient's treatment and outcome throughout their stay at the hospital. The plan is to use this information to identify future training needs and ensure we are providing top level EMS care.

Highlights/Unique Calls

- Several serious EMS calls.
- Mutual Aid fire in and with the City of Monroe on Hamilton Middletown Rd. E-211, E-212, Chief 210 and Inspector 211 all responded. Crews played an active role in suppression efforts and overhaul. Liberty Township also had units on scene. E-111, T-113 and Battalion 110.
