
We continued to see call volume increasing as restrictions are continuing to have less and less impact on department operations. This number is **391** calls ahead of last year's count.

Our daily call average for the month of May is 12.6 calls per day.


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We continue to experience an increase in back-to-back calls. We continue tracking this in 2023 in our efforts to remain proactive to changes in our community.

Mutual Aid continues to be a cost-effective means for all area fire departments to deal with surges in requests for service. You will note an increase in the number of calls we are using mutual aid. # **Fire Prevention**

During the Month of May we continued to monitor new construction projects here in the Township. Caliber Collision is finished and now open for business. Crews continue to add the finishing touches to the large commercial building at 8200 Seward Rd. We tested and passed the fire pump for that building, and we will be testing the fire alarm in the coming weeks. The exterior of the new Starbucks off Princeton Rd. is coming along, and we anticipate the second contractor will start building out the interior in the coming days. They have broken ground for the new Christian Brother Automotive next to Discount Tire, we are currently working with the contractor and looking at sprinkler and fire alarm plans for that building. Milk Jar Café in Bridgewater Falls passed their final inspection, and are open for business. They are located directly across from Target. The Timber Trails and Windsor Pointe subdivisions continue to grow with work continuing on several new homes and Multi Family Structures.

Fire inspections for May focused on reinspection's as well as a few Final inspections for new businesses. In addition to inspections, several building plan reviews were approved for future construction and remodel projects.

During the Month of May, we had the pleasure of taking part in Fairfield North's Vehicle Day, where we got to interact with the students and show them some of our apparatus. In addition to vehicle day, we also sprayed down the 5th graders towards the end of their school year which we enjoyed just as much as they did!

# **General Department Information**

Assistant Chief Matt Schumann resigned to take a position with the City of Monroe Fire Department.

We thank him for his many years of service to the township. He began his career here as a member of

our Fire Explorer program. He will be missed. We wish him all the best in the next phase of his career.

We are working with the Board of Trustees and the Administrator to develop a process for the hiring of a Fire Chief and now an Assistant Fire Chief.

We continue to hire additional part-time staff members. Crews will be very busy over the next month with orientation and on boarding of new part-time staff members.

We are working to schedule our Peer Support Training that we received grant funding to host.






# **Financial Information**

The Department continues our efforts to be fiscally responsible and operate within our budget.





#### Shift Accomplishments

• All three days have completed their Annual Hydrant Maintenance. This is when crews go out to check all the hydrants in the Township to ensure they are functioning properly. As crews find hydrants needing attention, they are sent to Butler County Water and Sewer. Once the work has been completed, a work order is sent back to us ensuring that the hydrant has been serviced.
