Got Drugs?



The Drug Enforcement Administration and Fairfield Township Police Department would like to invite you to participate in the 15th National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day on Saturday April 28, 2018

- ◆ This program is anonymous to protect the anonymity of individuals disposing of medications. No questions or requests for identification are made.
- ◆ Participants may dispose of medication in its original container or by removing the medication from its container and disposing of it directly into the disposal box. If an original container is submitted, the individual should be encouraged to remove any identifying information from the prescription label.
- ◆ **Our partnering incinerators can only accept pills. We cannot accept the following: inhalers, liquids, sharps, or glass bottles. If you choose to accept these items you will be responsible for the disposal. We will only accept pills, capsules, patches and blister packs.**
- ◆ **Illicit substances such as marijuana or methamphetamine are not a part of this initiative and should not be placed in collection containers.**

Substance Abuse In Fairfield

A handful of bad choices with regard to substance use can ruin the life of a young person and destroy a family.

Average age of first use in Fairfield is 12 for alcohol and 13 for marijuana.

Prescription medications are abused earlier than all other substances in our community.

14% of youth report regular underage drinking. Youth who drink underage are 5 times more likely to have abuse problems as an adult.

12.2% report regular use of marijuana.

Attitudes that support Marijuana Use are becoming more common as use becomes legalized.

Butler County has the third highest rate of heroin overdose deaths in Ohio - all among adults. Youth heroin rates remain low.

Coalition leaders track substance use trends and use proven strategies to respond to local threats as they emerge.





YOUTH-LED PREVENTION

Leaders in Training shapes self-esteem and identity in 40 middle school leaders.

Freshmen Youth Coalition develops coping and decision making skills in 30 Freshmen leaders.

High School Youth Coalition equips 100 high school students in prevention science, strategic planning, implementation and evaluation of youth-led prevention.

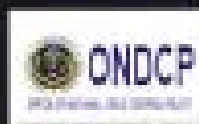
